## Pastoral Reflections

Each year, at the beginning of Advent, our church year starts anew. We enter into the season of waiting – like parents anticipating the birth of their first child, and like children waiting for Christmas morn. Our expectations are high with the possibilities of what will be, and yet, there is a bit of uncertainty, of hesitancy for what will be. There is enough unknown to peak our interest and to give us a bit of pause.

Holding onto both of these feelings, we enter into Advent once again. Each week we journey ever closer to the stable where the birth of God in the flesh will burst forth, pushing back the darkness with the cries of an infant born into our world – Emmanuel, God with us once more.

In Week 1, we hear from the prophet Jeremiah about the hope of a savior, a righteous branch that will spring up for David. He is proclaimed to have royal blood and will be the new king – *the King* of kings, the one whom the world has been waiting for. We sing the haunting tune of hope: *“O come, O come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel. That mourns in lonely exile here, until the Child of God appears”* (NCH #116).

Hope carries us into Week 2, where the intentional preparation of our hearts begins, as we hear the Prophet Malachi tell us that God is sending a messenger ahead of the Messiah, so we must begin to prepare the way of the Lord. We hear the first hints that the hoped for peace is coming for all people; what has been a time of upheaval, fighting and discord will soon give way to peace and comfort: *“Comfort, comfort, O my people, tell of peace, thus says our God...Speak unto Jerusalem of the peace that waits for them.* (NCH #101).

With hope and peace in our hearts, joy is truly possible. We slide into Week 3 of Advent and hear John the Baptist crying out in the wilderness that Jesus is coming, as the Prophet Isaiah reminds us to always sing praises to the Lord, for God has done glorious things for us. “Rejoice always” is Paul’s cry from Philippians chapter 4. We join with generations past as we sing: *“O come, O Dayspring, come and cheer our spirits by your advent here; Love stir within the womb of night, and death’s own shadows put to flight. Rejoice! Rejoice!”* (NCH#116 v.6)

And finally, on Week 4, we hear Mary’s song of praise, devotion, and love as she rejoices at what God is doing through her: *“My soul gives glory to my God. My heart pours out its praise. God lifted up my lowliness in many marvelous ways. My God has done great things for me: yes, holy is God’s name. All people will declare me blessed, and blessings they shall claim”* (NCH #119).

On Christmas Eve our joy is complete when the hoped for promise is born. Light bursts forth in the humblest, darkest corner of a tiny stable amongst God’s creatures, fulfilling the promise of God’s love born into human flesh for each of us. The angel’s proclaims: *“I bring you good tidings of great joy for all people...Christ the Lord is born”* (Luke 2:11-12). And, as we prepare to go home, we lift our voices in praise and love that God is born in us once again: *“Joy to the World, the Lord has come! Let earth its praises bring; Let every heart prepare Christ room, and heaven and nature sing!”* (NCH #132) May our hearts be filled with hope, peace, joy and deep abiding love.

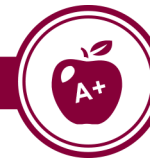

## From the President . . .

On November 11, 2021, there was a special ceremony held prior to the Boston Bruins/Edmonton Oilers hockey game for Colby Cave, a 25 year old professional hockey player, who died back in April 2020 from a colloid cyst which caused bleeding of the brain. A colloid cyst is a slow-growing tumor typically found near the center of the brain. Colby Cave, a well respected NHL player, left a young widow, Emily. I remember reading about Colby's tragic death last year. Emily lost the love of her life and her best friend far too soon.

My first reaction was how sad it was for someone so young to die. I cannot begin to imagine the pain of losing a son, daughter, husband, wife, or friend at such a young age. In this instance, a professional athlete, in top physical shape, seemed in good health one day and was battling for his life the next day. I know it can be difficult some days, but we need to make the most of each day we have. Enjoy each precious moment with your family and friends.

Another thought that crossed my mind was the timing of Colby's death. Back in April of 2020, the COVID pandemic had shut down many businesses, school lessons were being done remotely, and visits to nursing homes and hospitals to see loved ones came to a halt. Far too many people were dying alone. A limited number of people were allowed to attend the funeral or memorial service, so families were not able to have the normal support that they would typically receive. I have spoken to a couple of friends who lost loved ones during the pandemic and know it was an extremely difficult time. Hopefully, we will never have to face this situation again.

Since Colby started his brief career with Boston Bruins and finished it with the Edmonton Oilers, it was fitting for the two organizations to have a tribute during one of their games. November 11th was the first time the two teams met since Colby's death. Before the game, highlights were shown including his first goal as a Bruin. Emily walked out to center ice for the ceremonial first puck drop. They do put a mat on the ice, so Emily did not have to skate to meet the captains of both teams. Once at center, Emily shared hugs with both Patrice Bergeron, Boston's captain, and Conner McDavid, Edmonton's captain. Both will be in the

NHL Hall of Fame once their careers are over. I will admit that my eyes were watering the first time I saw a replay of the ceremony. After dropping the puck and the photo shoot with Bergeron and McDavid, Emily walked over to both benches where she received many more hugs. The next day on Instagram, Emily's response was "No words will ever be able to describe last night". It may have taken 19 months, but I am glad so many former teammates had the opportunity to extend their condolences to Emily.

The next day, Emily also explained why her embrace with a Boston Bruin, Brad Marchand was so meaningful. I did watch the tribute again and I did notice the hug was much longer than the rest. Marchand happened to be the last Bruin to see Colby alive. One of her fondest memories was enjoying a Thanksgiving meal at the Marchand's house. Being a veteran, he wanted to make sure the rookie and his wife had company for their Thanksgiving meal. Emily seized the moment to tell Marchand "he loved you so much". On her instagram the next day, Emily revealed what she said and added "I feel that is an understatement". In my opinion, a professional hockey team is more of a close knit family than any other professional sports team. The tribute to Colby Cave only solidifies my feelings.

Emily is currently involved doing charity work with the Hasbro Children's Hospital in Providence, RI. In a shout out to her late husband, she commented that "despite you being in Heaven, we are still changing so many lives down here. Forever your #1 fan, #26". Despite her tremendous loss a year ago, Emily is living her life and is having a positive influence on so many lives.

I know the holidays are coming and most of you will be spending quality time with family and friends. Enjoy those precious moments. Plus, it doesn't have to be just over the holidays. None of us knows how much time each of us has left. Please don't put off that visit until next month. I'm sure that call or visit will be greatly appreciated.

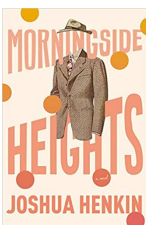


## Hayshire Book Club
